#### June 15th Deadline for Carriage Museum Bus Trip

On July 25<sup>th</sup>, 2009 the Connecticut Valley Driving Club will be taking a tour of the 'Long Island Museum of American Art, History and Carriages' (formerly known as the 'Stony Brook Carriage Museum'). This trip is open to both members and non members so please, anyone come! This museum, if you have never been there, is just about the best carriage museum anywhere in the world. And it is really in our own back yard!





We will be meeting the luxury Coach in Middletown at 8:30am and will be driven to the Bridgeport Ferry. The ferry ride itself is a lot of fun. There is food and beverage on board. You will enjoy beautiful views of the sound and shores, and the comradery of other driving enthusiasts. We will be eating our home made lunches (or our-bought on the ferry-lunch) on the boat. On arrival at Port Jeff, Long island, the coach will take 10 minutes to reach the Museum.

We will have a guided tour of the Museum's main building with its beautifully displayed carriages, coaches, carts and sleighs. Mr. Jerry Trapani and Mr. John Sciacchitamo have graciously offered to guide us through the collections. These two gentlemen will then take us back across the street and into the CARRIAGE STORAGE BARNS. This is a unique opportunity because these barns are not normally open to the public. They are just filled with vehicles, many unique or special in some way. You may never see this variety of carriages again. Our tour will prove to be an education for even the most knowledgeable among us.

At the end of our guided tour we can spend more time on our own in the Carriage museum or visit any other museum exhibition. There is also an extensive carriage library on the premises. We will then proceed via Coach and Ferry back home to our starting point to arrive home in the early evening.

This should be are really fun trip! We will have 47 seats at \$38 per seat, and you must get your check to Randy postmarked by June 15<sup>th</sup>. This is a very reasonable cost. #### Postcards from the Wedge How I Started Driving

It was early March 1996 when I attended a UCONN Horse Symposium with some trail riding buddies. We were always looking for another "HRA" (Horse Related Activity) to do. We were sitting in the stands of the old arena, before the nice new one they have now, when Pam Pruitt put on a driving demonstration with her Morgan mare, Cristal Belle Joy.

Until that day I was a happy backyard horse owner and trail rider. Well, not so backyard, because I boarded my horse at a local stable at the time. My quest began from that day, first for a house with a little more land than the acre and a third we had. I only wanted enough to put my horse in the back. And I told Jack I wanted a pony to drive. A pony.

Now let this be a lesson to you all- a passion can start so innocently, so benignly! A day out with friends and boom!

I looked at houses for 3 years. Nice house, no land. Nice land, bad house. Good house, bad location...it went on and on. Finally, late spring of '99, the agent called me and said, "Anne, I keep searching and one place keeps coming up." And so I found a place. Nice house, great location. No barn though. All in good time, I thought. We bought it and moved in. Unfortunately, we hadn't sold our old house and didn't for six more months.

I'll skip the story of my first driving experience: hitching my trail horse that knew nothing of driving but went placidly down the road with me behind her in a too small cart, harnessed incorrectly, and barely able to see where I was going over her rump. When I think of it I cringe. She's 31 now and been taking care of me for 17 years. But I digress...

One day, with the barn, er...stable built but no stalls yet, my dear friend Randy came over to the house waving a piece of paper, raving about ponies for sale. She had already made an appointment to go see them! Off we went. That was the day Jack lost his mind and bought a 4-in-hand of bay ponies, even though I stood by his side repeating, "I only want **one** pony to drive!" Neither one of us knew how to drive, but the ponies did! That was our saving grace. We rushed home and built the stalls. It was January and very cold. We only had a small 2 horse trailer so it took 2 trailers to get them home. They moved in, 2 to a stall. Gosh, I finally had my pony! Times four!

We joined the driving club, listened, read everything, asked questions and started to drive. I had a pony to fit my cart, at last. They were wonderful and took turns teaching me how to drive. In fact, one weekend Jack took a pair to our CVDC show at Allegra's and I took a single. We knew how to hook, that was about it. We had no help and did the show. Darned if we didn't get blue ribbons that day! I'm still flabbergasted when I think of it.

On it went this way for about a year. One day my phone rang and it was Pam Pruitt. She said she'd heard from a friend that I was trying to reach her. And my real training began.

Later, I bought my Morgan mare and sold the "girls" who are still happily driving and teaching new owners. I'm still taking lessons and learning and Pam has become my dear friend. But that is a story for another time.

#### THE PEPPER PROJECT - 2 Training the young horse to harness -by Erica Robb

Disclaimer: There are many ways to train a horse to harness. What works for one may not work for others. Please use common sense, have a plan and a knowledgeable helper. Stay safe!

WHERE WERE WE: Last month, we had Pepper lunging in a surcingle and crupper, and I was starting to gain some skills myself. We were learning trot, walk, and whoa, at the end of the line and in a nice circle. Now, we needed to aim toward gaining some steering.

BITTING: During the winter months, Pepper had gotten a little mouthy. Not that she bites, but she will lip and lick you to death. So we had started hanging a simple mullen-mouth snaffle in her mouth for brief periods. Pepper quickly became eager to have the bit since it was followed by a sugar cube. Yum! This is the only time she gets a sugar cube, and since she is now a little TOO eager to grab the bit, I have had to start "forgetting" to give it to her. The end result should be a young horse who is easy to bridle. We didn't do anything in particular with the bit, just let her wear it in her stall while I brushed her. She played in her water bucket, learning to drink around it, pretended to eat some hay, and generally spent some time getting used to the overall concept.



Pepper: on the top, still trying to figure out what to do with the bit, in spite of the lines being fairly loose; on the bottom, two weeks later, clearly much more comfortable.



Now we progressed to adding the bit to her training "attire," but still lunging off the halter. We started playing around with big circles/little circles, moving from one end of the ring to the other (the "scary" end where the boogie monster lives in the rocks). We added some ground poles to keep her focused on what we were doing, to teach her to look ahead and down, and to practice changing her stride to suit the terrain. Pepper and I were working well together, except those days when I had twelve thumbs.

LONGLINES: (Just to be clear in my definitions: by "long-lining" I mean working with two lines from the side, mostly in a circle to start. By "ground-driving" I mean working with two lines from the rear, as if driving.) One day, Cynthia attached the long-lines after I had worked Pepper briefly on the lunge. The goal was to get her going comfortably on the same circle she had already been doing, just with a different set of reins, and now off the bit rather than the halter. There was little real steering involved, just getting her used to a little contact with the bit. Her focus, which had begun to stray, snapped back to the job at hand. Cynthia encouraged her to make turns by putting a little more pressure on the outside rein, then driving her forward into the turn. Pepper clearly was not sure what to do, but was concentrating very hard, trying to understand this new development.

Then it rained. We took a few days off. I think it definitely goes smoother if we keep up with new concepts for a couple of days in a row. The second session was like a first time all over again. Pepper sat back once or twice, trying to figure out what to do about the bit, even though Cynthia had only very light contact. These early days are so important both for learning the skill of responding to the bit and for learning good work ethic. Her mistakes are largely ignored for now and silly stuff worked through

By the third time, Cynthia had Pepper beginning to make consistent turns, doing several in a row to each side. She tried briefly getting behind her to ground-drive, but Pepper came to a halt, clearly not sure what that was about. So we ended on a positive note with a couple more turns on the long-lines.

TURNING: Then it rained. Again, our training was interrupted, but we did manage to get a couple of days in a row. We kept to our routine of a short lunging session with me, followed by a long-lining session with Cynthia, who has more skill and better hands than I do. Pepper was doing very well, starting to respond to the bit when asked to turn, and even occasionally tipping her nose to the inside in a proper bend

We also had some interesting miscues. Pepper, ever the good student, started "guessing" when she was supposed to turn. I'm sure she thought she was being extra smart, but Cynthia just gently brought her back into the circle, slowly teaching her that a turn comes when she is asked, not when she volunteers. The next day, Pepper went one step further. To avoid the contact on the inside rein, she tried falling into the circle. When Cynthia held steady with the outside rein to keep her out, Pepper decided that meant turn to the outside. Inside-outside-inside-outside. There was a funny little wobble back and forth for a circle or two.

KNOW WHEN TO STOP: I am lucky in that Pepper's temperament is fairly easy-going. She does have her momentary spurts, but overall, her responses have been appropriate, even when misguided. She demonstrates how hard horses will try to understand what we are asking of them, and how sympathetic we need to be to recognize a "good guess." The most important thing, and sometimes the hardest thing, is to stop just when they are going nicely. When you want to do "just a little more" is precisely when you should stop. That moment of satisfaction will carry over to the next lesson and serve you and the horse much better than "just a little more." *Next month: more long-lining (and less rain).
